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In his bid, Armstrong estimated its costs at 6 percent of the first \$1.5 million grant (i.e., between \$90,000 and \$105,000) from the Wyoming Business Council to construct the center.

Costs from the second \$1.5 million grant will depend on how much of the project is completed in the bid for from the first grant, Sachse said.

Radio TEN estimated its costs at 8 to 9 percent of the first grant, or \$120,000 to \$135,000.

The board also unanimously accepted the bid from Wyoming Demolition of Sheridan for \$27,922

to demolish at least one building at 356 Brundage St., where the center will be constructed. It was the lowest of three bids received.

The one-acre site was donated by Whitney Benefits Inc.

If the architectural plan does not site Hand-In-Hand's parking lot where the current parking lot is, then Wyoming Demolition will be paid an additional \$4,500 to remove the old asphalt.

Sachse said he hopes demolition will begin sometime in February.

It is possible that one of the buildings at the site — the Girl Scout building — will be sal-

vaged and included in the architectural design of the new center, but no definite decision has been made, said Sheridan Mayor Dave Kinsky, who serves on the board.

The Wyoming Business Council would consider accepting a design that incorporates a building already on-site, Sachse said.

The SEEDA board will hold a noon special meeting Feb. 15 at the School District 2 administrative office to obtain signatures for the architect's contract.

The board will hold its next regular meeting at 5:30 p.m. Feb. 26 in the Griffith Building boardroom at Sheridan College.
